Last year I reported that our challenges have been financially driven and that trend has continued with pressures on every area of our £500k budget with our work levels ever increasing in these turbulent times. We continue to fulfil our statutory duties to a high level to maintain parks at Gossmore, Seymour, Riley, and Campbell Road play areas as well as allotments, play equipment, security, cemetery, town bus, verge and grass cutting, and Balfour gardens.

Our events are more popular than ever throughout our parish managed by six staff and 12 Councillor volunteers, and we maintain a high level of support to external organisations. We have great challenges ahead, but I am pleased to report we are in the final stages of a complete performance review of our Council that will be in place this summer and will finalise a strategic plan and organisation to challenge efficiency in all our work. As part of this, a major element will be to innovate new income streams and projects and focus

on strengthening community.

We are expecting to finish our fiscal year March 2024 in a strong financial position, with our income and expense accounts resulting in



a surplus due to a combination of increased revenue, expense savings, and some one-time items. The investment income has outperformed the budget partially due to the increases in interest rates and strong dividend income. We also received additional income from the rental of our offices for the Marlow Murder Club Series.

Our commitment to cost-efficiency has led to expense reductions in salary, subcontractors, community, and other areas compared to the budget while ensuring residents still received essential services and exceptional programmes like the town bus, private park security, and bespoke professional grass cutting. Additionally, there was no increase in Parish tax for 2024 -2025 - this is a significant achievement in the current inflationary environment while many Councils across the country struggle with balancing their books. We are looking forward to another strong financial year 2024-2025. Marlow Town Council is well positioned to meet our financial commitments and continue to maintain high quality services for all residents going forward.

We concentrate on economic development and tourism, community safety, engagement, and cohesion. We continue to offer residents several very successful events throughout the year, unfortunately not all that are planned go forward. Due to inclement weather, The King's

Coronation, Bee Town, and the Marlow & District Round Table May Fayre were all cancelled. These were all such a shame as a great deal of hard work, time and effort was lost.

Last May we presented the French Councillors From Marley-le-Roi with a 50th anniversary plaque at the annual Marlow Regatta. Looking forward, the committee is also considering several future capital projects to enhance the town and full details will be shared with residents when information is available. We will also be reviewing our communications to make full use of traditional and social media channels to promote the Council's activities.

PLANNING & TRANSPORT COMMITTEE

Marlow Town Council is a statutory consultee to the local planning decision making process within Buckinghamshire Council. The



Planning and Transport Committee meets every three weeks to review planning applications and other matters within the Marlow town boundary. We review all applications carefully, considering other consultee and residents' submissions and make appropriate comments or objections, which are submitted to the Planning Authority. The bulk of applications reviewed each year are for minor extensions, or changes of use, and we have a strong correlation with the Planning Authority's subsequent decisions.

We note that several former bank premises have not been fully redeveloped since closure of their retail locations. We have however reviewed several planning applications to reutilise these buildings and have been generally supportive of them. It would be good to see these closed premises brought back into use to further improve our busy town centre.

We are always mindful of the challenge of parking

availability in the town, largely brought about by the vibrancy of the town itself. Solutions that satisfy residents, visitors, and inward commuters (all of whom are essential to the viability of the town) continue to prove very challenging. We have recently approached Buckinghamshire Council to review a proposal which we submitted to the old Wycombe District Council for an appropriately designed multi-storey parking for the central car park situated to the rear of Sainsburys supermarket. Marlow Town Council contributes to a Buckinghamshire Council bus that provides town-wide weekday service and on certain days goes to High Wycombe and Maidenhead. During the year, we have worked with Buckinghamshire Council to review options for improving this service to have a more regular timetable. Details of the service are available on our website and in the Marlovian magazine.

A new Local Plan for Buckinghamshire is currently being developed and this will supersede the old Wycombe District Local Plan. It is unlikely that it will have any major impact on Marlow. However, following its publication, the Town Council will consider whether the plans for Marlow require further detailed work including the possible preparation of a Local Neighbourhood Plan. The Committee, which will remain with the same experienced members for the next twelve months, is looking forward to another busy and productive year for Marlow.

Over the past year we have been quite busy with environment and wellbeing initiatives. This is partly because residents and the planet demand more and better, and



partly because improving the environment is something I personally practice and would love to inspire others.

Environment and Wellbeing Action Plan

We set-out to provide our committee with higher-level strategic thinking so our time, effort and money is better spent on specific areas of interest and concern. This strategic thinking formed an Environment and Wellbeing Action Plan that defines our role, describes how we work and outlines five focus areas for our committee and MTC.

1. Biodiversity and nature

Support, improve, and protect plant, wildflower, insect, and animal habitats and encourage residents to connect with and care for nature.

2. Active travel

Promote the benefits of walking/biking/scooting to school or town, find ways to make it a more positive/enjoyable/accessible experience and encourage residents to choose active travel over driving.

3. Recycle, reuse and refill

Promote more sustainable living behaviours and habits regarding single-use plastics, recycling, and water/ electricity consumption and encourage reusing/repairing products, refilling over buying new.

4. Spark moments of joy

Create positive experiences/interactions for residents to foster good vibes and community spirit through art, music and new ways of connecting.

5. Support schools and local groups

Amplify initiatives from schools and groups, and empower students to educate residents.

Biodiversity and Nature

Pollinator action plan

This was co-written with the help of Wild Marlow. It explains Marlow Town Councillor's commitment to pollinators and identifies six objectives.

No Mow May

The first day I took over the committee last May I introduced 'No Mow May' with a press release to residents and adjusted our grass maintenance in all areas (except high traffic) accordingly. Surprisingly, we had no resident complaints and 'No Mow May' is happening again next month.



We have made further

adjustments so that cutting resumes in early June for all areas Marlow Town Council is responsible for excluding wild verges. There is a full-page cut-out in the March Marlovian to encourage residents to take part and display the sign in their window to hopefully encourage others.

Wild verges

Last spring/summer we launched 'wild verges'. These areas of grass (normally cut eight times during the season) are left to grow wild to support pollinators as habitat, shelter, and food. A special 'Wild Verges' map was created

with local artist Nicola Metcalfe to educate residents where Marlow Town Council is responsible for cutting and the 'wild verge' locations. We also created signs to educate residents as to why the grass is long placed in the actual areas. This spring/summer we have expanded our wild verges across the town. I personally visited Marlow primary schools and met with their Eco-teams.

We discussed the importance of wild verges and I asked them to join our efforts in creating a pollinator corridor – you can see on the map which schools have participated in 'wild green' areas on their land.



Additional improvements

Removed all glyphosate from grounds maintenance and with our contractor.

Raised the height of the mower blade to 6cm (on grass that is not high traffic) to allow for daises and other ground flowers to be left untouched when the grass is cut.

Active Travel

Active travel map

This map was created with Nicola Metcalfe to encourage school children, parents, and residents to walk, bike or scoot to town and school by highlighting that any corner of Marlow is roughly a mile or less to the top of the high street and children attending school in catchment will be the same.

New footpath policy

We can't encourage Active Travel if we don't have the proper footpaths to walk around. The goal of this policy is to raise awareness and understanding of residents' responsibility regarding their garden vegetation spilling over onto footpaths and rendering them less usable and potentially unsafe. The policy also outlines how to correctly report obstructed footpaths so they can be cleared. Let's

work together to keep our footpaths clear so we can better support people who depend on them for Active Travel and hopefully encourage others to start walking as well.

To kick-off this policy and encourage more Active Travel we have engaged our grounds maintenance to clean-up the footpath along the football path (MTC's responsibility) cleared and trimmed back along the top and around the lights, so it is not as dark and overgrown.

Community collaboration

Working with Nick Rowcliffe and Mark Skoyles of Living Streets to bring to life a joint Active Travel community project.

Mobile Vehicle Activated Signs (MVAS)

MVAS are electronic signs which only become visible when approaching motor vehicles are exceeding a

certain speed. We have implemented several initiatives involving MVAs machines to remind drivers of safe speeds and encourage Active Travel confidence.

- 1. Positioned MVAS machines on key Active Travel school crossings to proactively discourage speeding.
- 2. Gained approval to buy a fourth MVAS machine in

March so we can have two machines simultaneously on two roads monitoring in both directions.

3. Created a list of high traffic roads near schools where school children will be crossing along and other roads known for speeding (with the help of local residents) and put together a permanent list of roads that create a permanent MVAS machines rotation. Each road will have two MVAS's deployed for 6-8 weeks to proactively discourage speeding by flashing when exceeding 30.

Recycle, Reuse and Refill

Refill map

Did you know that you can get a water bottle filled for free at numerous locations across Marlow? Well no one seemed to know so we also created a Refill Map with Nicola highlighting all the different places in



Marlow you can get your water bottle refilled for free so we can work together on discouraging single use plastic water bottles.

Events and Misc

Bee town

Sadly, due to strong winds the Bee Town Festival was cancelled last summer. So, we contacted the Marlow Library and they kindly allowed us to display



the beautiful boards we created for the public to see.

Marlow Carnival Green Village

We had a booth at the event with information boards about everything we have been working on and some tips to save water and electricity and recycle. We also asked a Bucks recycling expert to attend the event to help answer any recycling questions.

MTC Website

A new environment tab has been added to the MTC website and restructured previous and new content to allow easier access to environment.
